



I'm sitting in the brightly lit offices of global sex-toy brand Fun Factory on what I hear is a rare sunny day in Bremen, Germany.

Alina Eynck, 23, the company's newest (and youngest) designer, is graciously walking me through the process of how she designed Mr. Boss (\$95, funfactory .com)—a vibrator that's curved specifically to stimulate a woman's G-spot. I nod in approval as she describes how she got the size, shape, and flexibility just right. Then Eynck's boss,

Simone Kalz, 44, shows me her latest creation: The Volta (\$140, funfactory.com), a clitoral stimulator that flutters faster than my eyes can follow. I'd just toured the company's actual factory, where I witnessed about a hundred employees and a dozen machines bringing Mr. Boss and The Volta to life, and it's clear that these two humble women should have way bigger egos. They don't seem to get how major they are or that they're pioneers in a female-led pleasure quest revolutionizing sex as we know it.

"The sex brands most people are aware of were created by men," says certified sex educator Alicia Sinclair. (Case in point: Fun Factory was founded in 1996 by two guys making dildos out of Play-Doh in their kitchens.) "Men aren't using these products themselves, so I don't think there's been a lot of thought on how the toys interact with women's bodies or what makes us feel sexy." That's why many vibes focus on two things—penetration or shaking hard (aka what a man assumes feels amazing to a woman)and why a lot of them are ergonomically hard to hold or made of toxic or sketchy materials.

Coming in (super) hot:

a new squad of female designers, like Eynck and Kalz, who are using modern technology to reinvent adult playthings to cater to women's comfort, complex arousal processes, and erogenous hot spots. Since 2015, more than 100 women from all over the world have joined Women of Sex Tech, a community for sex-toy company founders, executives, and other girl bosses. And major manufacturers have started to hire a lot more women (at press time, 62 percent of Fun Factory employees were female).

As a result, the \$15 billion adult-tov biz is quickly morphing from a male-dominated empire to an even more valuable vulva-pleasing, women-for-women industry. "The demand for better products, accurate content, and education has created a huge change," explains Meika Hollender, cofounder and co-CEO of the sexualwellness brand Sustain Natural and author of the new book *Get on Top*. "By pulling back the curtains and having open, honest, and real conversations about sex, the taboos and stigmas are lifting on sex technology."

"Women are now creating toys that are really thoughtful and based on their own experiences," adds Sinclair. And those toys are being marketed in sex-positive, inclusive, and empowering ways.

Personally, as an editor who's covered sex for seven years, I couldn't be more excited for this feminist revolution...and you should be too. Read on to learn how five notable fempreneurs in the adult market are about to deliver you a way more pleasurable future.

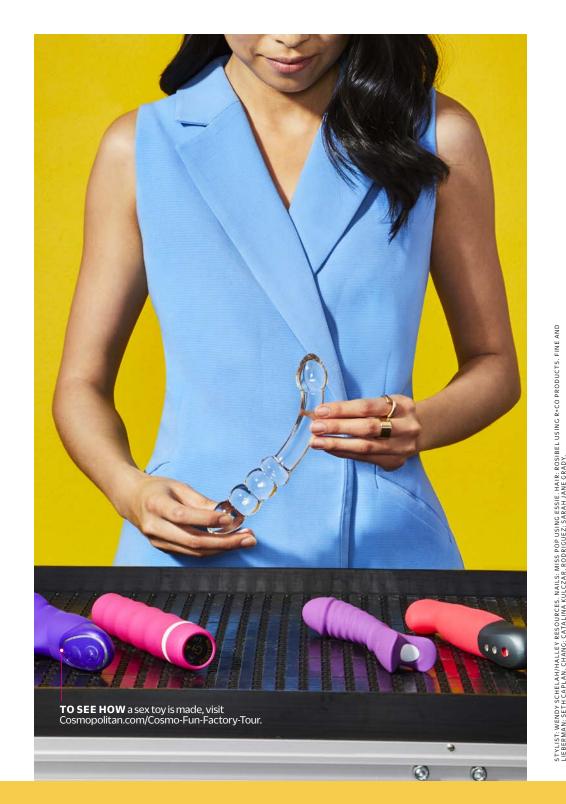

Why They Do It

JANET: "It made no sense to me that you could spend \$150 on something and have it maybe not work at all. I felt cheated, and I wanted to make a difference." Why She Does It "I was in a sex shop in Boston buying a toy for myself, and I was baffled. It's like the products were treating female orgasms almost as a joke or novelty. Like, 'Oh, put this bunny rabbit or dolphin inside of you....' Or they were all male-centric and penisshaped. It's not always about the D! I decided to make vibrators out of high-quality materials that look good, feel good, and fit into a woman's life."

Her Best Work With two bendable tips that conform to the unique contours of your vulva, Crave's Duet Flex (\$109, lovecrave.com, 3) looks as fancy as a smartphone and was satisfactionapproved by beta testers.

37, founder of COTR, a parent company to B-Vibe, a line of anal toys for couples; Le Wand, a userfriendly upgrade to the Hitachi Magic Wand; and The Cowgirl, a luxe, rideable sex machine

Why She Does It "I had three ideas: I wanted to start a line of all butt stuff, revolutionize the wand, and take this really classic, iconic sex machine that everyone knows about and make it look sleek, sexy, and hotter to women. To be honest with you, I'm creating products in a way that I wish they would be developed. Like, how is it possible that someone doesn't make these items look nice?" Her Best Work Le Wand Pearl White Rechargeable Massager (\$170, lewand massager.com, 4) has 10 vibration speeds and is cordless. Say buh-bye to wall plugs, wand users. ■

TELEDILDONICS

Bluetooth compatibility lets your longdistance lover control your vibrator's intensity and speed from afar in real time (nice!) via a smartphone app. Try We-Vibe's Sync (\$199, we-vibe.com).

VIDEO RECORDING

For a never-before-seen view of your O. the internal vibe The Svakom Sex Selfie Stick (\$155. lovehonev.com) uses the small. illuminated video camera on its tip to film the inside action.

SOUND RESPONSE

Newbies like OhMiBod's Club Vibe 3.OH Hero (\$129, lovelifetovs.com) use built-in microphones to pick up sounds—like vour S.O.'s voice or vour fave music—and then match their pulses to the beat.

BENDABLE MATERIALS

MysteryVibe's Crescendo (\$179. amazon.com) is the first completely flexible vibrator that can conform to your every curve.



PRESSURE SENSORS
